
'Frostheart' by Jamie Littler'




'The Accidental President' by Tom McLaughlin




the new national spider plan to spot the dastardly plot unfolding right under his nose.




'Greta Zargo and the Death Robots from Outer Space' by A. F. Harold




together beautifully at the book's climax, and thanks to another typo on a key document.




'My Brother is a Superhero' by David Solomons

'The Terrible Thing That Happened to Barnaby Brocket' by John Boyne




'There's A Werewolf in my Tent!' by Pamela Butchart




'Goblins' by Philip Reeve


'Race to the Frozen North: The Matthew Henson Story' by Catherine Johnson




'Sweet Pizza' by G. R. Gemin


'Billy's Brain Booster Juice' by Becci Murray

'The Apprentice Witch' by James Nicol



A giant Indian elephant.


A wild journey across America.

'The Twits' by Roald Dahl


Maybe even kill . . .

Augustus Gloop - a great big greedy nincompoop


Veruca Salt - a spoiled brat

But what mysterious secrets will they discover?




'George's Marvellous Medicine' by Roald Dahl

One Saturday morning, George is in charge of giving Grandma her medicine.



'The BFG' by Roald Dahl


On a dark, silvery moonlit night, Sophie is snatched from her bed by a giant.




'Toad Rage' by Morris Gleitzman


'The Last Castaways' by Harry Horse

'The House That Sailed Away' by Pat Hutchins



Still determined to fulfil his mission, Max discovers the best way to cross the road - with the help of the lollipop lady and some careful detective work . . .






'The Worst Witch -Complete Adventures' by Jill Murphy

She keeps getting her spells wrong and crashing her broomstick. And when she turns Ethel, the teacher's pet, into her worst enemy, chaos ensues...




'The Suitcase Kid' by Jacqueline Wilson


It's as easy as A B C. That's what everyone says. But all I want is to go home - back to Mulberry Cottage...

Can Tim survive the horrors of a week absolutely packed with activity? Can his team - the Tigers - be the overall champions? There are some surprises in store for everyone!




'Billionaire Boy' by David Walliams


Yes, Joe has absolutely everything he could possibly want. But there's just one thing he really needs: A friend.

Will's brother Marty is always playing practical jokes.



A little girl who desperately wants a dog introduces an imaginary Great Dane called Henry into her home.


Her wish comes true when she is allowed a real Henry. Was old Mrs Garrow, with her cackling laugh and black cat, responsible for her wish coming true?



'Give Peas A Chance' by Morris Gleitzman



'The Battle of Bubble and Squeak' by Philippa Pearce






'The Spiderwick Chronicles' by Holly Black & Tony DiTerlizzi

Book 1 of The Spiderwick Chroniclesin which Mallory, Simon and Jared get acquainted with their new home but find many unexpected things.



'Toots Underwater' by Carol Hughes




'I Swapped My Brother On The Internet!' by Jo Simmons


'Radio Boy' by Christian O'Connell

'Head Kid' by David Baddiel



'The Treasure at the Top of the World' by Clive Mantle




'Vlad the Drac' by Ann Jungman




'Nim's Island' by Wendy Orr

Nim lives on a beautiful island in the middle of the wide blue sea with her father, Jack, an iguana called Fred, a sea



'The Way to Sattin Shore' by Philippa Pearce



'The Story of Doctor Dolittle' by Hugh Lofting





'My Friend's a Gris-Kwok' by Malorie Blackman


When Mike finds out that his best friend, Alex, is a Gris-Kwok and can turn into any animal he chooses, it's the start of some crazy adventures!




'Wed Wabbit' by Lissa Evans




is your fault. Wed Wabbit is an adventure story about friendship, danger and the terror of never being able to get back home again. And it's funny. It's seriously funny.
