



The Great Elephant Chase - Gillian Cross


Saffy's Angel - Hilary McKay


The Borrowers – Mary Norton


The Boy at the Back of the Class - Onjali Q. Rauf


Silverfin - Charlie Higson


The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas (Paperback) - John Boyne


Chronicles of Narnia; The Lion The Witch and The Wardrobe – C.S. Lewis


The Many Worlds of Albie Bright - Christopher Edge


The Wind in the Willows - Kenneth Grahame


Wonder - R J Palacio


Dan Hope - Lara Williamson


Treasure Island - Robert Louis Stevenson


Carrie's War - Nina Bawden


Raspberries on the Tangtze – Karen Wallace


War Horse - Michael Morpurgo


Skellig - David Almond

Eren - Simon Clarke



So there's this doctor. He says there's a chance for you. But he also says it's experimental, controversial and risky. And it's never been done before.




Holes - Louis Sachar


The Girl of Ink and Stars – Kiran Millwood Hargrave


Armistice Runner - Tom Palmer


Millions - Frank Cottrell Boyce


Granny – Anthony Horowitz


The Dragon Keeper - Caroline Lawrence


The 1,000 Year Old Boy – Ross Welford


The Nowhere Emporium - Ross MacKenzie


What if there exists a world powered by imagination? A world of silliness, where humans and their toys live on long after they've left the Hard World... and what if the door between that world and this one was broken?

not only put her family, but the future of magic itself in danger.




The Space We're In - Katya Balen



Rebound - Kwame Alexander


