With Christmas fast approaching, and perhaps presents including new technology, it is important that parents are aware of how to set up games and/or consoles with parental controls.

First, check the PEGI rating of any games to ensure that your child is old enough to play them. PEGI provided age rating of games to suit the suitability to a child, not it's difficult. However, it is important to note that PEGI does not take into account the chat facilities within a game. Therefore the game may be 'age appropriate' but allows them to communicate with other users. Parents and careers are therefore encouraged to adjust the setting or disable the chat feature completely so it is more appropriate for the child

Secondly, it is important that consoles have the appropriate controls such as restricting spending limits and managing how or who they can communicate with.

WHAT IS AN INFLUENCER?



An influencer is somebody with a high amount of followers on a social media platform, such as YouTube, TikTok and Instagram. Influencers share their ideas and opinions and are sometimes paid to advertise/promote products on their accounts. Sometimes their 'views' could be prejudiced (e.g. racist or misogynistic) and can be interpreted by the follower as fact.

It is important to talk to your child about the spread of misinformation online and how to critically check and analyse what they see and hear online. Some social media platforms are influenced by algorithms which predict what type of context we are most likely to interact with. Whilst sometimes there are some positives to algorithms, sometimes once we start looking at certain content our social media feed can become more aligned with that option therefore creating an unbalanced picture and/or view.
