

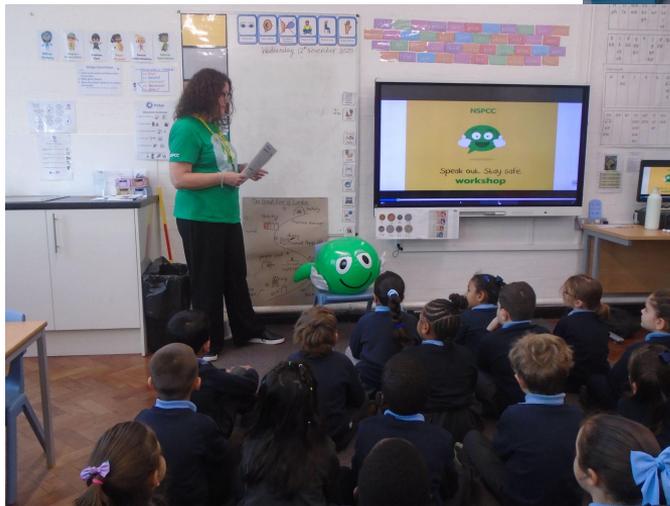

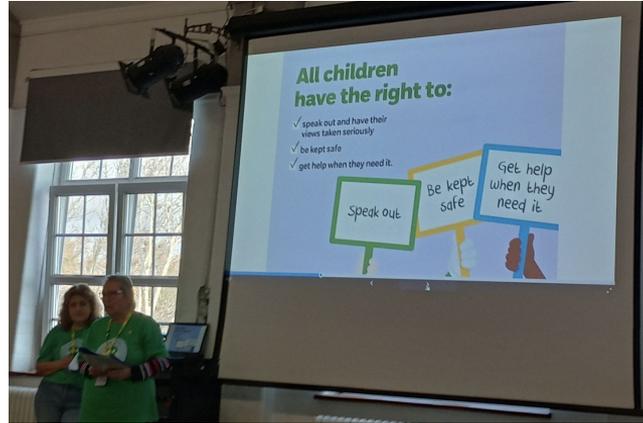

“You can just be kind to everyone. It doesn’t matter who it is. ”

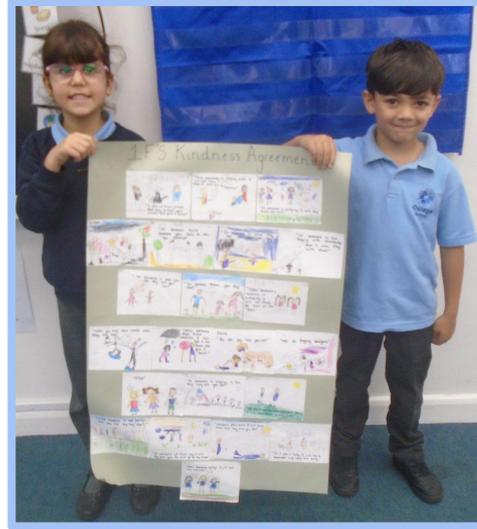

A child doesn't like playing chasing game but other are still running after them

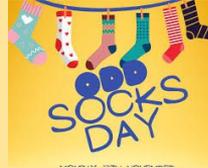
*I would ask others why don't we play a different game and if they disagree, i would leave with the specific person. **Andrei***

What is bullying?

Bullying is when there is an imbalance of power and the person with the power is making someone feel uncomfortable or causing harm physically or emotionally. The most important thing is that it is a repeated action that happens over a period of time.



What do you do to keep safe and respectful online?

I always make sure I am respectfully and treat other people kindly so it is the same as when I see them in person. I make sure I report things that make me feel uncomfortable to an adult.

What helps us feel safe ?

If you have issues you can talk to very kind staff. You can talk to your teacher and trusted adults in school.. There are lots of people who we can talk to like Mrs Ponti. Ms Helen and Mrs C who help deal with problems and support us with our choices.



What would you do if you saw someone being unkind to someone else?

I would tell an adult straight away and report it. I know that adults in school are there to help and support us and will deal with things fairly.



We looked at the different roles that people might have when someone is being bullied, even if they don't mean to harm anyone directly themselves - Alexander

We should all be kind and respectful towards each other and never be in any way involved in bullying. We should treat others how we would want to be treated ourselves.
